


How Does Filmmaking Relate to Climate Change?



But you can still think about how you could portray sustainability and the environment in your story, even if it's not about the climate. How does it affect your characters' daily lives, what effect does their lifestyle have on the planet, and how can you show sustainable lifestyles as normal in your representation of the world?



If you're scouting locations, look locally and encourage your team to use public transport. Maybe do Zoom auditions, and source props and costumes second-hand. Now is the time to get everyone in your team on board with making sustainable decisions in their work.

PRODUCTION

The most intensive time for sustainability considerations is during production, with cast and crew together shooting footage. But there's still lots you can do to work sustainably. Try using LEDs which use less energy than other lighting. Encourage your team to bring reusable water bottles, reduce meat-based meals on set, and consider how your presence on location might impact the local wildlife and what you can do to defend natural biodiversity.



RELEASE

Congratulations, you've finished your production!
Celebrate the successes in sustainability you achieved for your film, and learn from the experiences that were more challenging. All lessons are positive!



Post has a smaller impact than other parts of the production timeline, but it can still use lots of electricity, which in turn generates emissions. Ask whether the power you're using is on a 'green' tariff and make an effort to turn off lights and machines when not in use. This is also the chance to finalise spotlighting sustainability on screen - for example, choose a shot that shows solar panels, a wind farm or an electric vehicle in the background to open your scene.

Top Five Keywords

Confused about the terminology around climate change, sustainability and all things green? We know it can get a little overwhelming – fear not, we've picked out top five keywords to know to help you out.



Climate Change

The long-term changes in the Earth's climate, or a region on Earth, including variations in sea levels, snow and sea ice. This leads to other direct and indirect changes to temperatures, weather, seasons and more across the globe

The cumulative name of the 7 main greenhouse gases that are recognised as contributing to global climate change.

These can be generated naturally but also directly from human behaviour such as transport, electricity production or landfill disposal



The total amount of greenhouse gases generated by our actions. They are calculated using emission factors that tell us the amount of emissions associated with a set unit of activity e.g. travelling 1000km in a train in the UK emits 44kgCO2e



Content and themes that touch on the environment and/or sustainability in stories, helping audiences understand and inspiring them to make greener choices

albert Certified Production

A production that has completed a carbon footprint calculation and successfully implemented positive sustainable actions, to be awarded BAFTA albert Certification. This certification has evolved over the years, but can now be identified with the BAFTA albert footprint stamp on their end card after the credits saying 'albert Certified Production'
